

Alibaba: The House That Jack Ma Built



Synopsis

An engrossing insider's account of how a teacher built one of the world's most valuable companies - rivaling Walmart and - and forever reshaped the global economy. I've read all the books published in English about Alibaba and I've read maybe 70-100 articles on Alibaba and Jack Ma. The book manages to bring up new details about the company and its leader with our overlooking any of the well known details. Moreover, the description of the strategies employed by Alibaba in its early stage is excellent. Great book.

There are a lot of information in this book, however not much of them delves into the way Jack dealt with crisis facing Alibaba on its early days. For instance, the way he managed to raise capital from Venture capitalists still left much to be desired as it was only mentioned in a mere few sentences. The author could have instead dugged further into analyzing Jack's problem-solving talent during the numerous turmoils, rather than providing a series of Alibaba's competitors, whopping numbers, names of chinese entrepreneurs which just simply slipped off my memory the instance I finished a chapter. If you want to know how Alibaba was born and how it has become a global internet powerhouse today, this book is for you. However, if you want to know how an english teacher from mainland china navigated his ways through the ups and downs of the Dotcom frenzy, I hope there will be better versions in the making.

Poorly written, The writer went from financing deal to financing deal with next to no explanation of the innovations, staff issues or personal issues Jack Ma faced. For instance, the writer referred to certain products but never explained what they were or to explain how they were innovative. He frequently referred to the fact the consumer-to-consumer portal Taobao is free, failed to explain how it's a money-making enterprise. And then there are the many other companies such as cloud computing, shopping search engines to which a passing reference was made but were never adequately described. Moreover, some conclusions reached by the author didn't naturally follow the proposition asserted and left me confused. Finally, as for Jack Ma--we heard about his speaking engagements, but nothing at all about his personal life. Altogether, this was a remarkably unbalanced and sometimes bewildering account that left me with more questions than it answered. Where or where was the editor?

Only reason for the 4 star vs 5 stars is because I felt there was a lot of unnecessary information (facts/names/numbers) added in that made it feel more like a case study for school at times.
